EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR FOR IDAHO RACING COMMISSION SPEAKS WITH RTIP STUDENTS IN THE JOE HIRSCH FORUM



Tucson, AZ — The Spring 2014 Joe Hirsch Speaker Series left the gate as Frank Lamb of the Idaho Racing Commission came to speak to Race Track Industry Program students regarding multiple aspects of the industry from working with the horses to simulcasting.

Lamb started the discussion with his background in the industry. He then went into detail about the various places, like Wyoming and Oregon, he has worked and how the experiences helped him over the years.

Topics ranged from advice for racing secretaries to dealing with horses at the starting gate.

In the Advanced Racing Law and Enforcement

class he went into more detail about racing commission operations. From staffing to allotting race days, he touched on different aspects and described each challenge they might face. Different legal cases were talked about along with their implications to the racing industry.

The RTIP students got to see how what they were learning in the classroom translated to real life applications.
